

Sarah Abu-Kaf is a senior lecturer in Cross-Cultural Psychology and the Head of the Conflict Management and Resolution Program of Ben-Gurion University of the Negev (BGU). She earned her PhD in Clinical Psychology at BGU and completed her post-doctoral studies in the Department of Anthropology of Harvard University. Her work focuses on different sources of stress, coping resources and coping strategies, different idioms of distress, and mental health difficulties among different subgroups within the Arab society (students, youth, women, and elders), as well as in other disadvantaged minorities in the Israeli society. Dr. Abu-Kaf is a board member of the Association for Multicultural Psychology and plays a leadership role in developing programs in culturally competent clinical psychology and culturally competent student's services. She has received several awards and fellowships, including the Fulbright-Rabin Post-Doctoral Scholar in the Medical Anthropology program at Harvard University, the Maof Fellowship for Outstanding Arab Lecturers, and the Israeli Council for Higher Education Award in the Young Researcher category. Abu-Kaf was named to the Women in Science Hall of Fame by the US Department of State, as one of a group of 11 women from the Middle East and North Africa (MENA). Furthermore, she was selected by Forbes Israel as one of the 50 most influential women of 2018.
